

Top 40 MBA Programs for Building a Better World: Corporate Knights global MBA ranking shows how world's top business schools stack up on sustainability

TORONTO, October 9, 2015 – *Corporate Knights* released today its 2015 Better World MBA Ranking, the definitive annual guide to which MBA programs are doing the best job preparing students to tackle the social and environmental challenges of our time.

The ranking reveals which MBA programs offer the best package of core courses, breath of faculty research and support centres to foster the most comprehensive sustainability-oriented learning experience.

This year's ranking focused on 121 programs including the 100 listed in the Financial Times (FT) 2015 Global MBA Ranking and 21 other schools with a strong track record in business sustainability education.

The Schulich School of Business at York University was the top-ranked program this year, continuing its long run as the leading sustainable MBA program in the world. It earned a high grade in all three evaluated categories with 125 pieces of published faculty research in the past three years, as well as three core courses and 15 relevant institutes and research centres.

In all, the Top 40 MBA Programs for Building a Better World hail from 10 countries including Canada, Denmark, South Korea, United States, France, Germany, Australia, Netherlands, India and South Africa.

Rounding out the Top 10 were McGill University – Desautels Faculty of Management, Copenhagen Business School, KAIST, University of Calgary – Haskayne School of Business, Georgia Institute of Technology – Scheller College of Business, University of Cambridge – Judge Business School, Massachusetts Institute of Technology – MIT Sloan School of Management, Harvard University – Harvard Business School, and Duquesne University – Donahue Graduate School of Business.
